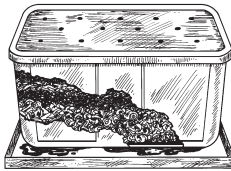


Open Holding Units

Holding units, as pictured on the previous page, are easy to make by shaping wire mesh or fencing into a ring or by tying wooden pallets together to form a cube. Holding units are temporary and transportable, and they improve the appearance of a compost pile, plus they aid in heat retention by containing the materials. Open units require more frequent watering since they tend to dry out and are generally used to compost yard trimmings, such as grass clippings, weeds, old flowers, plants and leaves. Just add these materials as they are generated. This method is a slow and cool process that will produce compost in six to 18 months.

Vermicomposting

Placing red worms in a wooden or plastic bin with a moist bed of leaves, shredded cardboard, paper or newspaper, can convert vegetative food scraps into worm castings, which is another way of producing a nutrient-rich form of compost.



Household worm bins are often used in compost programs for apartments and offices where people have limited yard space.

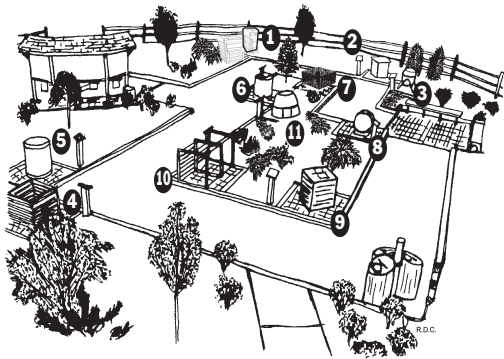

The County used recycled products as much as possible to construct this site. The benches, recycling/trash collection containers, landscape ties, planters, and bird feeder are made from recycled plastic lumber. Ocean County's compost was used for planting the vegetation.
