


Figure 1 – Louis Glanzman, *Toms River Block House*, 2010, Oil on Canvas, Ocean County Cultural & Heritage Commission

#### HISTORICAL BACKGROUD

The American Revolution was not only a fight for independence but a civil war within a war—one that divided neighbors, families, and entire communities. While battles raged at Trenton, Princeton, and Monmouth, the struggle for liberty also played out in the marshes, forests, and bays of southern jersey, where Loyalists and Patriots fought.

New Jersey earned its title as the "Crossroads of the American Revolution," with more engagements that any other state. Yet some of the conflict's most personal stories unfolded along the Jersey Shore. These waters and pine forests served as both refuge and battleground - a landscape of saltworks, privateers, and hidden inlets vital to the Patriot cause.

The Battle of Chestnut Neck and the Defense of Egg Harbor saw fierce fighting as British forces

attacked bases supporting American privateers. Further north, the Manahawkin Skirmish and the Long Beach Island Massacre revealed the war's human cost and the dangers of divided loyalties.

The Toms River Blockhouse Fight brought devastation and the execution of Captain Joshua Huddy, whose death became a rallying cry for Patriots. And finally, the Affair at Cedar Bridge Tavern marked the final documented land engagement of the Revolution.

For the people of Jersey Shore, the war was in their own backyard. Their courage, perseverance, and sense of duty echo the Scout Oath and Law—to be brave, loyal, and helpful. As America approaches its 250th anniversary (2025–2033), Scouts can honor that legacy through service, exploration, and citizenship rooted in the same spirit.

#### **America 250 Scout Event Planning Guide**

#### **Based on National 250th Commemoration Practices,**

#### **Adapted for Scouting America**

#### **Planning Guidelines**

This guide provides a framework for Scouts, leaders, and community partners to plan and host a meaningful commemoration of the 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution. Events may range from solemn ceremonies to hands-on service projects, all emphasizing citizenship, heritage, and community pride.

#### **Step-by-Step Planning Process**

#### 1. Choose the Focus

Identify the central theme or purpose of your commemoration: honoring a Revolutionary hero, marking a key date, or improving a historic site. Examples include a "Trail to Liberty" hike, a flag dedication, or a history fair.

#### 2. Secure the Location

Obtain permissions from park offices, municipalities, or private landowners. Confirm insurance requirements through your council or chartered organization. Consider accessibility, parking, and restrooms for participants.

#### 3. Set the Date

Select a date that connects with Revolutionary milestones or local anniversaries.

#### 4. Form a Planning Committee

Include both adults and youth with clear responsibilities:

- Event Chair: Oversees all planning and coordinates with partners.
- Youth Coordinator: Engages youth participants, assigns readers and flag bearers.
- Safety & First Aid Lead: Ensures a first-aid kit and trained personnel are on site.
- o Program Lead: Develops agenda, invites speakers, confirms timing.

 Communications Lead: Manages promotion, social media, and photography.

#### 5. Coordinate with Partners

Reach out to local Cultural & Heritage Commissions, Historical Societies, Veterans Organizations, schools, and civic groups. Encourage them to co-host or provide educational displays, music, or interpreters.

#### 6. Confirm Logistics

Reserve tables, chairs, podium, microphones, flag stands, tents, and signage. Conduct a pre-event walkthrough to ensure smooth setup. Have a rain contingency plan if outdoors.

#### 7. Create the Agenda

Follow the *America 250 Scout Commemoration Ceremony* template: Welcome, Colors, Reflection, Scout Service Moment, Guest Remarks, and Closing. Keep total time within one hour and balance youth and adult speakers.

#### 8. Publicize the Event

Submit notices to local newspapers, town calendars, and Scouting newsletters. Post on RevolutionNJ's online calendar and your council's website. Include logos for Scouting America and America 250 when permitted.

#### 9. Safety & Emergency Preparation

Review Youth Protection requirements for all participating adults. Ensure hydration, shade, and safe flag-handling procedures. Designate an emergency meeting point.

#### 10. Rehearse and Confirm

Hold a short run-through with color guards, readers, and emcees. Check microphone volume, order of ceremony, and flag presentation sequence.

#### **Conduct of Ceremony**

#### Welcome and Greetings:

Emcee or youth leader opens with introductions, acknowledging host unit, partner organizations, and community guests. Emphasize the purpose: to honor the service, sacrifice, and ideals of the American Revolution and connect those values to Scouting today.

#### Presentation of the Colors:

Performed by a Scout color guard. Include U.S. flag, Unit banner. Lead the Pledge of Allegiance and Scout Oath.

#### Invocation or Reflection:

Led by a Chaplain Aide or invited faith leader. A short prayer or moment of gratitude recognizing freedom and unity.

#### Scout Service or History Moment:

Scouts present brief readings about Revolutionary-era events or local patriots.

Encourage each age group to contribute:

- Cub Scouts: Place flowers or flags at a memorial.
- Scouts BSA: Read short biographical sketches or diary excerpts.
- Venturers/Sea Scouts: Explain the Revolutionary significance of local waterways, trade, or maritime actions.

#### Guest or Scout Speaker:

Invite a historian, veteran, or Scout leader to speak on "Courage, Service, and Leadership—Then and Now." Keep remarks concise (under 5 minutes).

#### Scout Commitment & Reflection:

Youth lead a short responsive pledge:

"We pledge to preserve our history, to serve our community, and to honor those who fought for freedom."

Follow with reflection on Scout Law—Loyal, Brave, Reverent.

Moment of Silence and Closing Prayer: Led by Chaplain Aide or leader. Include brief moment for silent reflection.

#### Retiring of Colors and Closing Music:

Flag ceremony followed by recorded or live rendition of *America the Beautiful* or *God Bless America*. Optional group photo at conclusion.

The Historic Trails Program encourages Scouts to explore the story of the United States through direct engagement with its landscapes, landmarks, and communities. By hiking, camping, or performing service projects along designated historic routes, Scouts connect the ideals of citizenship, outdoor adventure, and historical understanding.

Each participating unit selects a trail officially recognized by Scouting America or develops a local route with documented historical significance—such as a Revolutionary War campaign road, canal path, or pioneer settlement route. Scouts research the site's background, plan and complete a hike or camping experience, and perform a meaningful service project that aids in preservation, interpretation, or community education.

Completion of these steps earns the Historic Trails Award, represented by an emblem and certificate. Beyond recognition, the experience cultivates stewardship and appreciation for the nation's evolving story.

For the 250th Anniversary of the American Revolution, the program offers a natural way to engage youth in living history—whether marching a segment of Washington's 1778 route through New Jersey, maintaining a battlefield trail, or helping a local museum preserve its grounds. Each trail becomes a classroom in patriotism, service, and discovery.
