1. Introduction

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Office of Community Planning and Development (CPD) requires a recipient of federal entitlement grant funds to develop a Consolidated Plan (ConPlan). The County of Ocean takes an initiative to provide the maximum personal independence for a homeless person and an at-risk person of becoming homeless through the design and implementation of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Continuum of Care (CoC) model.

The County of Ocean has significantly increased its efforts towards coordination and collaboration across the many systems of care in an effort to serve the most at-risk residents including homeless persons, at-risk persons of becoming homeless, veterans, and unaccompanied youth. As a part of the Consolidated Plan planning process, the County of Ocean will utilize its Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI) and other tools to identify where underserved populations are located and concentrated. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) receives a "special tabulation" of data from the U.S. Census Bureau American Community Survey (ACS). The Needs Assessment (NA) section describes the primary housing needs assessment in the region based on the data in each table. The housing needs are largely based on an income level per a household by size, racial/ethnic composition, cost burden, and a number and percentage of a renter and an owner occupied housing problem (s). The formula calculates for a disproportionate need that exists in the jurisdiction of the County of Ocean.

Introduction

The County of Ocean is consistently steady with population growth because of new employment growth in retail trade, business relocation, and existing business expansion. The unemployment rate for the County of Ocean and the State of New Jersey is as follows:

- New Jersey 3.6%.**

While some residents are able to benefit from transportation, retail and other employment opportunities, as well as, public parks and school systems, however, many low-income neighborhoods still do not have equal access to these assets located in different parts of the County of Ocean. Describe the workforce and infrastructure needs of the business community:

Economic growth is dependent on the continuing development of the local labor forces that include, but not limited to the low- and moderateincome residents. Education is a key workforce development need that should include, but not limited to adult education and supplemental education activities for primary and secondary school students. Furthermore, the regional education system limits the advantage in making the most of our human capital assets because of the following shortcomings: foreign-born residents have lower educational attainment levels than the regional average, and the need to retain the college educated, young adult population.

In the years ahead, the trend suggests the demand for high skilled employees will increase twice as fast as the demand for lower skilled workers, and will be particularly strong in a specific subset of occupations, such as engineering and technology. The County of Ocean's workforce will continue to depend on a large pool of residents that have attained higher levels of education.

According to a U.S. Census Bureau American Community Survey (ACS) report, the educational attainment in Ocean County is the following:*

- Percentage of high school graduate or higher 92.3%.
- Percentage of bachelor's degree or higher 30.3%.

The most critical infrastructure for the business community remains transportation infrastructure. Traffic congestion frequently makes a list of top concerns within the community and congestion may increase as our population growth rate rises. The population has alternative modes of transportation options that offer accessibility to: sidewalks, bike lanes, bus service, and mass transit. The Ocean County Workforce Investment Board (WIB) oversees the workforce development activities and it establishes a job program in response to the workforce needs. The WIB is committed to a comprehensive workforce development system that operates through its One-Stop Career Center and satellite centers conveniently located throughout the County of Ocean, if applicable. The One-Stop Career Center offers a wealth of training, information, and assistance for businesses and job seekers.

The WIBs commitment to a One-Stop Center is a best practice for employers to articulate their employment needs to adults, dislocated workers, and the youth. This Center offers resources to guide vocational trainers and educators in creating demand driven curricula, programming, and counseling that lead workers into sustainable careers.

The One-Stop Career Center helps the job seekers (particularly people receiving unemployment insurance) to navigate the job search process and to improve their life skills to meet the changing needs of the economy. The One Stop Career Center offers resources for both a job seeker and an employer:

- Job seeker Job search assistance, access to online job listings, career counseling and coaching, networking and guidance on unemployment insurance, access to computers, resume building software, and reference materials.
- **Employer** Provides access to qualified applicants, job postings, help with planning job fairs and other recruitment activities, assessments of job candidates, and information on training grants and tax credits.

In addition, the One-Stop Center specializes in supportive services that target when unemployment dislocates the economy, workers experience a disability, veterans and his/her family need employment and training, and other groups in reduced circumstances.

A Designated Target Neighborhood (DTN) is a place with a higher concentration of non-White alone (not Hispanic) population. Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

The federal funds listed above represent the annual allocation received to support the activities outlined in this Action Plan, as well as, the anticipated funding for the remainder of this Consolidated Plan. Historical allocation are the basis for establishing the estimates of funding. This Consolidated anticipates a similar level of funding. An activity will only receive funding upon receipt of the federal funds.

The Ocean County Planning Department (OCPD) does not receive additional resources directly, but it does collaborate with multiple agencies that receive funding from various other sources. The County of Ocean will continue to meet its twenty-five percent (25%) matching funds requirement for the HOME program. All eligible matches will be from a non-federal source and will be a permanent contribution to the HOME program. The County of Ocean has a paper match that meets the matching requirement for a housing rehabilitation project. As the administrator of the Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program (TBRA), the OCPD will continue to provide the required matching funds obtained from the NJ Social Services for the Homeless Block Grant. If an affordable housing grant award goes to a Community Housing Development Organization (CHDOs), then the CHDO will provide in excess the required twenty-five percent (25%) matching fund requirement. In addition to the federal funds provided, the private and the non-federal resources expectation be available for carrying out this Action Plan. Each municipality sharing in the cost burden may assist in reaching completion of an activity more efficiently using CDBG funds. A CDBG grant provides a funding allocation to an activity in the form of a grant that may leverage another investment. All sources of funding (federal and non-federal) must support the specific activity with funding and/or incentives that promote furthering affordable housing and/or promote an activity that improves a community's public facility and infrastructure. Often a CDBG and a HOME fund for the completion of an activity is leveraged with a resource from the State of New Jersey and/or another resource like a local government capital improvement fund and/or a resource from a private-sector foundation.

Assess of Strengths and Gaps in the Institutional Delivery System

The CDBG and HOME programs do improve the lives of citizens through an increase in partnerships with housing associations that include, but not limited to Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), regional and local non-profits, government agencies, private foundations, and other organizations. Each agency has the confidence to set and meet the goals of the community needs because each has its own standard of commitment, resources, and expertise from a broad range of partnerships in the public and private sectors, and the local network of community-based and non-profit groups. The mosaic shows that the institutional delivery system of partners collaborate together to leverage resources effectively here in the County of Ocean.

The public and private sector collaboration is essential to serving the varied needs of the low-income population in the County of Ocean. Many County of Ocean governmental departments do participate in the delivery of comprehensive services that provide a service to individuals and families. Often a County department takes the lead of the partnership to address the needs at hand. Partnership agreements assist in organizing the workflow to maximize resources that limit or avoid the duplication of services that the lead agency manages.

The demand for supportive services is a larger known gap than the one for the availability of resources. Therefore, the realities limit the scope for major change. These realities include, but not limited to the following:

- Quantity of necessities needed daily.
- The capacity of the network to perform transfers between links in the delivery system.
- The qualifications are not adequate with the use of supplementary aids and services, and within the same service of work for a uniform and normal distribution. For a service provider, a continuous distribution of the need and a discrete distribution of the need is a critical setup in targeting the beneficiaries of an area beforehand. The funds exhaust exponentially when knowing the need to service. For instance, two houses may need a boiler but the work performed at each house is different. One house requires just an installation of a new boiler system and the other house requires work to replace the floorboards to support the weight of the new boiler and an installation of a boiler. Each activity has the same need (a new boiler installation) but the work performed is entirely different and the labor and material costs are different too. However, other services fill need as a continuous distribution of service, such as the food banks, to strengthen more beneficiaries. In many cases, the need may be too large to treat each individual event in a discrete manner.

In many situations, the service to fill the need often lends itself to market forces essentially because the partnerships can maximize their use of funds on more beneficiaries through the combination of materials, labor, land, and technology in such a way as to capture a higher yield of beneficiaries (in excess above the cost of production).

Describe how the service delivery system including, but not limited to, the services listed above meet the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth)

The Ocean County Board of Social Services (BOSS) is the primary point of entry for the intake and referral coordination of individuals and families of low- and moderate-income. The BOSS provides both public and private prevention resources, including the County of Ocean's Rental Assistance Program, which provides a short-term financial assistance to individuals and families that can experience exposure to an eviction and homelessness. The Boss also provides homelessness prevention resources to individuals and families that seeks the eligibility and the referral for rapid re-housing (RRH) assistance. The Boss completes the initial evaluation for RRH assistance.

When a potential client telephone calls the BOSS, this governmental agency begins the case management procedures to screen and evaluate the eligibility of a client for a supportive service.

Describe the strengths and gaps of the service delivery system for special needs population and persons experiencing homelessness, including, but not limited to, the services listed above

The County of Ocean funds many programs that continue to be in high demand. Often the delivery of service meets or exceeds the demand for the service; that makes the program successful. However, a discourse from stakeholders is suggesting that a better client screening and assessment process is necessary to improve a community wide targeting of supportive housing to end chronic homelessness. Within the homeless system and the supportive housing industry, several key factors impede effective targeting of supportive housing for the chronically homeless population. These shortcomings may identify strategies for building a robust Coordinated Assessment system that may better serve the chronically homeless population.

Overcoming impediments requires an assessment tool that coordinates its integration into a mainstream service system. The goal of ending homelessness requires an automation of network

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processes that improve the speed, accuracy, and consistency of the client screening and assessment process and that target the scarce resources like vacant housing units more efficiently and accurately. An assessment tool will be effective in moving the target toward the goal of ending homelessness.

A Central Referral System (CRS) assessment tool is a data driven approach that refers various service providers and system level strategies as efficient pathways to supportive housing for vulnerable populations. Ultimately, a CRS can support applying for housing on a website (an application is not a guarantee to housing). The housing available can include the following:

- Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) | Affordable housing with services.
- Permanent Housing with Short-Term Support | Affordable housing with services for up to 24months.

Essentially, a CRS is a coordinated assessment that targets the current housing situation for a vulnerable population. If comprehensive and well integrated with a mainstream service system, strong networks for mission critical services can identify the living situations that include, but not limited to the following:

- Living on the streets or other location not fit to live in, like a car, abandoned building, bus/train/subway station or airport.
- Living in an emergency shelter, in a hotel/motel paid by organizations, or fleeing domestic violence with nowhere to go per night.
- Living in an institution (examples include a nursing home, jail or prison, mental health hospital).
- Living in an interim housing program.
- Living in a permanent housing with short-term support program.
- Living in a permanent housing unit for formerly homeless persons.
- Staying with family and friends in a room, apartment or house.
- Temporarily living in a hotel/motel that you are paying for yourself.
- Renting your own apartment or house (with or without a housing subsidy program).
- Living in an apartment or house that you own.

Provide a summary of the strategy for overcoming gaps in the institutional structure and service delivery system for carrying out a strategy to address priority needs

The homeless services system is fragmented and difficult to navigate. For a person in a housing crisis, he/she needs to find the best supportive service program that meets his/her needs that include, but not limited to affordable housing, emergency shelter, permanent supportive housing, prevention services, rapid re-housing, transitional housing, and other services. When a potential client finds a suitable program, many times the entry into a program requires criteria meeting an eligibility requirement that is unique and complex.

A Coordinated Assessment (CA) system could remedy many of the challenges that a client faces when seeking access to the homeless services system. A CA system with a web portal interface can provide a client with the most appropriate housing intervention, the service (s) that best meet need, and a housing referral and placement that is suitable and accurate.

Implementing a CA program may not immediately result in additional services or housing options for people experiencing homelessness or at-risk persons of homelessness. However, an effective CA system allows the community to begin developing a strategy for a process based on the data collection and the quality of the collection method, evidence based best practices, and a thorough analysis of consumer need. A client service based on a universal assessment that prioritizes a client, and allocates service to the most vulnerable - chronically homeless "first" instead of the traditional "first come, first served" method.

A CA system could also allow access to use data that identifies the number of individuals in need of the different types of housing interventions. A CA system can store and retrieve how many units and what types of housing services are required to meet the needs of our homeless population. A CA system can integrate network systems operated by various service providers to determine when a client may be ready to exit a Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH), thereby increasing capacity. A CA system could also include the expansion of housing opportunities through mainstream network integrations with partnership agreements between Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), integral medical care, private foundations, and Public Housing Authorities (PHAs).

Estimate the number of extremely low-income, low-income, and moderate-income families to whom the jurisdiction will provide affordable housing as defined by HOME 91.315(b)(2)

The County of Ocean anticipates continuing the same production amount of affordable housing units as accomplished in previous years with the HOME program funds. The Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TRBA) funding will target units to the extremely low-, very low-, and low-income persons. The Housing Rehabilitation and First-Time Homebuyers (FTHB) funding will target the very-low income and the low- and moderate-income families.

SP-65 Lead-based Paint Hazards - 91.415, 91.215(i)

Actions to address LBP hazards and increase access to housing without LBP hazards

The reduction of Lead Based Paint (LBP) hazards in the housing stock is an annual objective in the County of Ocean. As a part of the CDBG and HOME funded Housing Rehabilitation Program, each house is LBP hazard inspected and tested. The County of Ocean offers assistance to make repairs and address code violations and safety issues to a home. The Housing Rehabilitation Program, as per protocol, is to have a certified Lead Based Paint (LBP) inspector and a risk assessor perform an inspection and an assessment on all properties built prior to January 1, 1978. When a housing unit tests positive for lead, a certified contractor remediates and abates the lead hazard, otherwise an occupant (s) cannot live in the unit. Before a residency can begin again, the unit must be completely remediated and receive a Certificate of Occupancy (CO).

The County of Ocean also takes steps to educate all recipients of HOME and CDBG funds on the hazards and dangers of lead-based paint. The County of Ocean distributes the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) pamphlet, Watch Out for Lead-Based Poisoning, and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) pamphlet, Protect Your Family from Lead in Your Home, to all of its program recipients. The latter pamphlet informs homeowners on how to prevent lead from becoming a health concern in the home. The Ocean County Department of Health (DOH) is primarily responsible for community outreach and elevated blood level testing. The DOH shares information on inspections and blood lead levels with the Ocean County housing choice voucher (HCV) program. This procedure informs the Ocean County Board of Social Services (BOSS) on the actions it needs to take with a landlord that operates a rental housing unit (s). Another part of the DOH service includes, but not limited to the following:

- Educating primary health care providers and promotes blood lead testing.
- Performing medical case management of children with elevated blood lead levels.
- Inspecting homes for lead-based paint hazards and order remediation when hazards found.
- Analyzing lead test results in the blood of a person and linking that data to housing information in order to identify the higher-risk housing and the lowest-risk housing.
- Conducting inspection on a prospective day care facility to determine the existence of a leadbased paint hazard.

How are the actions listed above integrated into housing policies and procedures?

The policies and procedures call for full compliance and enforcement of lead-based paint regulations listed in 24 CFR Part 35. Contractors, subrecipients, and other community partners receive the lead-based paint regulations and advisories. The Ocean County Department of Planning Department (OCPD) adheres to the regulations and it informs its partners about the regulations and requirements before and after an inspection, testing, and abatement of a lead hazard occurs.

Contractors and inspectors are required to have lead-certification licensure for testing and/or abating lead from a property, if they participate with the CDBG and HOME funded Housing Rehabilitation Program. In addition, the OCPD and Ocean County Department of Health (DOH) distribute literature and information on lead hazards to households that may be an at-risk household to exposure.

Jurisdiction Goals, Programs and Policies for reducing the number of Poverty-Level Families

According to several U.S. Census Bureau American Community Survey reports, here are statistics of persons living in poverty in Ocean County as follows:

- Living in poverty 10.7%.*
- Living in extreme poverty 5.0%.**
- Persons without health insurance under 65 years 7.7%.***

The County of Ocean supports the Continuum of Care (CoC) with coordinated services that enhance the lives of our residents, particularly those most in need from an infant to a senior citizen. The Continuum of Care (CoC) receives support from the CDBG and HOME programs and other sources of funding. The goal of the CoC is to provide a critical and emergency human service to individuals and families so that they may maintain their self-sufficiency. The County of Ocean works together with its network of community-based organizations, social service providers, and institutions. The partnership objective is to administer a basic need that improves their quality of life for low-income residents.

The Ocean County Department of Health (DOH) manages many programs - HIV prevention, lead poisoning abatement, mental health, violence prevention, and Women, Infants, and Children Supplemental Nutrition (WIC) – that focus on low-income communities throughout the jurisdiction of the County of Ocean. The WIC program acts as an income supplement, providing case management, coordination with other needed services for those at high risk of malnutrition, healthy food, and nutritional education. The DOH's programs serve to improve the chance of a household having a stable residence, healthy family members, and sufficient health that enables steady employment.

The Ocean County Board of Social Services (BOSS) operates a Medicaid program that pays a medical bill (s) for individuals and families of low-income that qualify for assistance through a program administered by either the BOSS or the federal government. The operations of this program involve case managers that enroll a client in Medicaid as an effort to ensure that the cost of medical care is covered, rather than by the client's own limited funds.

How are the Jurisdiction poverty reducing goals, programs, and policies coordinated with this affordable housing plan

In this Consolidated Plan and Action Plan, some of the poverty reduction programs and the affordable housing programs may be managed by the Ocean County Department of Planning (OCPD), as well as, the Ocean County Board of Social Services (BOSS), the Ocean County Health Department (DOH), the Public Housing Authorities (PHAs), and other local government departments. This administration structure allows for the most efficient, effective, and comprehensive management of supportive services that reach individuals and families of low-income.

The Ocean County Consortium's First-Time Homebuyers (FTHB) Program has a family self-sufficiency component, previously a Housing Choice Voucher (HCV), which helps low-income households to maintain decent employment and/or gain further education that supports their economic independence and self-sufficiency. The FTHB program participants voluntarily transfer into an affordable housing program, such as the down-payment assistance component. When FTHB individuals or families are determined to be at a financially stable point in their life, then they can maintain homeownership. In addition, all housing program recipients are required to receive housing counseling and training that supplies homebuyers, renters, and homeowners with the skills and knowledge they need to be successful in maintaining their home, as well as, their finances.

SP-80 Monitoring - 91.230

Describe the standards and procedures that the jurisdiction will use to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and will use to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

The County of Ocean Planning Department (OCPD) is responsible for ensuring compliance with federal regulations and guidelines for the CDBG and HOME funds. As a part of these compliance measures, the OCPD staff performs its monitoring activities that include but not limited to technical assistance, desk reviews, and on-site monitoring of a Subrecipient.

A contractual agreement signed with each Subrecipient, contractor, grantee, etc., ensures long-term compliance. These agreements include a detailed scope of services, the federal general provisions, and Title 2 CFR Part 200 Uniform Guidance (Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards). As part of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Subrecipient monitoring policy, the OCPD staff reviews all Uniform Guidance reports pursuant to the requirements.

The OCPD uses various administrative mechanisms to track and monitor compliance with record keeping, financial standards, and programmatic requirements. The goal is to ensure that activities meet timeliness and compliance with federal, state, and local regulations. Additionally, the OCPD staff uses a risk analysis process to determine the Subrecipient to monitor and utilize specific protocols and procedures to complete a monitoring assessment. A monitoring session is a resource to help establish or maintain proper accounting policies and procedures in order to improve the internal controls and operational efficiency of a Subrecipient.

The OCPD has a construction, monitoring, and compliance process. This procedure covers all federally assisted projects for both long-term compliance and monitoring of construction standards. The monitoring of construction includes, but not limited to a review of payroll and a contractors' sworn statement to ensure compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act, the New Jersey Prevailing Wage requirement, as well as, the Section 3 requirement. The Davis-Bacon and/or the NJ prevailing wage rate, the Section 3 requirement, the Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) hiring, the Women Owned Business Enterprise (WBE) hiring, and the local hiring requirements receive a monitor review before a drawdown request releases federal funds. In addition, the OCPD records and submits the contractor and subcontractor information that includes, but not limited to the MBE and the WBE participations to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The OCPD is also responsible for ensuring that a long-term affordability requirement for a CDBG and HOME assisted project, as well as, a review that includes, but not limited to a tenant's household income, a Fair Housing Requirement, and a physical condition standard requirement met of other various programs.

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The housing rehabilitation program requires a screening and an eligibility qualification process, as well as, the head of a household must sign an affidavit that declares the dwelling is a primary residence and that monitoring will occur at the dwelling on an annual basis. An affidavit must explicitly state that monitoring is a requirement for participating in a federally funded program.

Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

The federal funds listed above represent the annual allocation received to support the activities outlined in this Action Plan, as well as, the anticipated funding for the remainder of this Consolidated Plan. Historical allocation are the basis for establishing the estimates of funding. This Consolidated anticipates a similar level of funding. An activity will only receive funding upon receipt of the federal funds.

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The Ocean County Planning Department (OCPD) does not receive additional resources directly, but it does collaborate with multiple agencies that receive funding from various other sources. The County of Ocean will continue to meet its twenty-five percent (25%) matching funds requirement for the HOME program. All eligible matches will be from a non-federal source and will be a permanent contribution to the HOME program. The County of Ocean has a paper match that meets the matching requirement for a housing rehabilitation project. As the administrator of the Tenant Based Rental Assistance Program (TBRA), the OCPD will continue to provide the required matching funds obtained from the NJ Social Services for the Homeless Block Grant. If an affordable housing grant award goes to a Community Housing Development Organization (CHDOs), then the CHDO will provide in excess the required twenty-five percent (25%) matching fund requirement. In addition to the federal funds provided, the private and the non-federal resources expectation be available for carrying out this Action Plan. Each municipality sharing in the cost burden may assist in reaching completion of an activity more efficiently using CDBG funds. A CDBG grant provides a funding allocation to an activity in the form of a grant that may leverage another investment. All sources of funding (federal and non-federal) must support the specific activity with funding and/or incentives that promote furthering affordable housing and/or promote an activity that improves a community's public facility and infrastructure. The CDBG program provides decent affordable housing, public services to the most vulnerable, and rehabilitation of housing to the residents of the County of Ocean. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) provides its HOME program grant on a formula basis to State and local governments - often in partnership with local non-profit groups. A local community may use the HOME funding on a wide range of activities that include, but not limited to building, purchasing, and/or rehabilitating affordable housing for rent or home ownership and/or direct rental assistance to low-income persons. The CDBG and HOME programs do improve the lives of citizens through an increase in partnerships with housing associations that include, but not limited to Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), regional and local non-profits, government agencies, private foundations, and other organizations.

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

Both the CDBG and HOME programs are contingent upon the action of the U.S. Congress to fund them. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) distributes the CDBG and HOME funds to its entitlement jurisdictions using a formula allocation. Subsequently, the County of Ocean receives its annual allocation of CDBG and HOME funds:Â

CDBG

The primary objective is the development of viable communities through the provision of safe and affordable housing to a low-income household of the CDBG program, suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities. A CDBG eligible activity can expense funds to include, but not limited to Public Service, Community and Economic Development, Public Facilities and Infrastructure Improvements, and Housing Rehabilitation.Â

The most qualified and eligible applicants receive funding based on their financial need for the public

funding and for the ability to address the high priority needs determined in the Needs Assessment and that Housing Market Analysis sections. Additionally, the needs identified by stakeholders and citizens who participated in the development of this Consolidated Plan and Action Plan receive funding to address those needs for low- and moderate-income persons.Â

HOME

The HOME funds support housing activities that meet local housing needs and typically preserve or create affordable housing uses that include, but not limited to tenant-based rental assistance, rehabilitation, homebuyer assistance, new construction, and acquisition or rehabilitation of affordable rental housing. The intent is to provide a safe and affordable housing to a low-income household, expand capacity for a non-profit housing provider, strengthen the ability of a state and local government to provide housing, and leverage private sector participation in housing projects of the HOME program.Â

Affordable housing exists in the County of Ocean. The municipal government, in accordance with the State of New Jersey Council on Affordable Housing (COAH), is responsible for affordable housing.

The primary obstacle to addressing underserved needs is that the demand for supportive services is larger than the availability of resources.

Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

The County of Ocean's rationale for prioritization of its investment geographically is on income and community development needs. However, the County of Ocean consists of twenty-nine participating municipalities (many participating biennially) and four entitlement municipalities. The CDBG funding distribution is to the entitlement municipalities and the County of Ocean on a formula basis established by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), including a Low and Moderate Area (LMA) determined by HUD as exceeding 51% of low- and moderate-income in a U.S. Census Block Group. The four entitlement participating municipalities include Brick Township, Jackson Township, Lakewood Township, and Toms River Township. Each municipal government makes a recommendation based on a priority need to fund an eligible activity in its jurisdiction. Other factors considered in determining a geographic location are the severity of the condition and the environmental development factors.

Introduction

The County of Ocean is active in developing its strategy that delivers need to low- and moderate-income persons, homeless individuals and families, and underserved populations. In the section below, the majority of the planning and strategy is a direct action that implements a collaboration with non-profits communities, municipalities, and other partner agencies.

The County of Ocean implements a wide range of programs aimed at fostering and maintaining affordable housing. For instance, actions to reduce and to eliminate lead-based paint hazards are coordinated with the Ocean County Department of Health. Each agency that administers a housing program strictly enforces the lead-based paint abatement requirements on units constructed prior to 1978, and those units and public buildings, which accommodate or house children.

The following narratives will outline the specific actions that address and develop an institutional structure to ensure that the success of an activity aims to benefit individuals and families that includes, but not limited to the low- and moderate-income, the underserved, the homeless, the at-risk persons of homelessness, and the poverty-stricken. Additionally, the actions will benefit areas of affordable housing and it will benefit the abatement of lead-based paint hazards.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The County of Ocean's underserved include but not limited to the elderly, the frail elderly, the HIV/AIDS individuals, the physical or mental disabled, the homeless, the unaccompanied youth, and the extremely low-income households. The County of Ocean is deciding on and arranging in advance the following actions for the period of this Consolidated Plan and Action Plan. These actions include but not limited to the following:

- Applying for federal and/or state funding sources to better focus on the underserved needs, and support funding applications from other entities within our jurisdiction.
- Provide access to affordable housing for an extremely low-, very low-, low- and moderateincome family through a new construction or a rehabilitation of a rental unit for these income groups.
- Provide down payment and closing costs assistance, along with mortgage assistance at an affordable rate to enable the ownership of a home.
- Provide support to homeless individuals and families, and another member of an underserved population, by allocating funds to a non-profit agency that provides a service to those populations.
- Promote cooperation between agencies by participating in different coordinating bodies, such as the Community Housing Advisory Committee (CHAC), Community Emergency Assistance Services (CEAS), and the Continuum of Care (CoC).
- Address infrastructure deficiencies in a low- and moderate-income area that include an

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identified CDBG Designated Target Neighborhood (DTN).

- Provide assistance to support housing that includes, but not limited to a senior only unit housing project for the elderly and the frail elderly, rental housing, senior referral, and socialization service.
- Support a tenant-based rental assistance (TBRA) program and other emergency housing and utility assistance to prevent homelessness.
- Support housing for a physical and a mental disabled person that includes rehabilitation and development of aging housing stock.
- Support a CDBG and a Continuum of Care (CoC) program for individuals and families with children to prevent homelessness.
- Support a program that distributes and targets housing and public service to extremely-low and low-income persons that may include, but not limited to Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA), housing rehabilitation, rental assistance, public safety, medical and dental care, and family counseling.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The County of Ocean will continue to invest in an affordable housing project that provides a rental and a homeownership opportunity for a low- and moderate-income household with federal funds. The County of Ocean will preserve and enhance the supply of affordable housing for an extremely low-, very low-, low- and moderate-income resident by implementing the following activities, among others:

- Provide a down payment and a closing cost subsidy to an eligible extremely low-, very low-, lowand moderate-income first time homebuyer.
- Provide HOME (entitlement and set-aside) program funds to certified Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), housing developers, or a partnership of these groups, for the development and rehabilitation of multi-family rental and single-family ownership housing, and the acquisition with or without rehabilitation of single-family housing.
- Provide HOME program financial assistance to an eligible household for the rehabilitation of an existing homeowner occupied residence.
- Leverage HOME funding to ensure optimal financial capacity, if possible.
- Provide a 24-month rental subsidy through the Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) housing program.
- Preserve affordable housing through liaising with a housing agency to effect a measure aimed at a foreclosure prevention, a mortgage modification, a refinance and other work out strategy to retain a decent and safe housing option.
- Ensure constructed, purchased, and rehabilitated housing that utilizes HOME and other federal/state funds remain affordable for the prescribed period. These criteria will be enforced through deed restriction and monitoring.
- Support a Public Housing Authority (PHA) and its' Workforce Housing Program. This program mandates that a specific number of housing units for households with incomes of 60-140% of

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Area Median Income (AMI) in a new residential development.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) regulation 24 CFR Part 35, entitled, Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention in Certain Residential Structures. This regulation requires that lead-based paint (LBP) hazards be controlled before the rehabilitation of a housing unit that is financially assisted by the federal government or being sold by the government, particularly if young children (ages 6 and under) will be occupying the unit. The Ocean County Department of Health (DOH) is responsible for lead hazard exposures within the County of Ocean. The County of Ocean, in implementing its housing rehabilitation program, assesses LBPs in all units constructed prior to 1978. The County of Ocean utilizes up to \$10,000 per single-family detached housing unit for inspections of LBPs, hazard reduction of LBPs, and the temporary relocation of occupants during the hazard reduction phase of the process.

The County of Ocean will undertake some of these actions to address and/or reduce lead-based paint hazards:

- Promote lead hazard remediation by providing families, communities, and professionals with knowledge and technical assistance regarding lead-based paint testing and abatement programs.
- Promote awareness and dissemination of information about lead hazards, recalled toys, and other children's products.
- Coordinate lead source identification with appropriate departments and organizations to ensure that the guidelines for lead reductions are consistent with all rehabilitation programs and codes.
- Require inspection of residential structures built prior to 1978 for lead-based paint hazards funded through federal, state, or local programs.
- Require lead-based paint inspections of commercial buildings built prior to 1978, especially, if children will use that building, and if funding for the rehabilitation/improvement is from federal, state, or local programs.
- Ensure lead poisoning screening to at-risk children.
- In New Jersey, a Medicaid-eligible child, particularly under the age of 72 months, requires testing for lead poisoning. All blood lead test results are reportable and if its' results are greater than or equal 10 μg/dL, the result will be reported to the Ocean County Health Department for inclusion in their Children's Lead Poisoning Database.
- Allocate funding to cover the costs of the LBP testing and the LBP abatement, in connection with the rehabilitation of housing units.
- Advising property owners of potential LBP contamination in older homes when the owner receives housing rehabilitation funding through housing rehabilitation programs.
- Complying with applicable regulations by recordkeeping all results of lead-based paint

inspections and abatements.

• Educate a First-time Homebuyer (FTHB) of lead-based paint hazards and provide a FTHB with the U.S. Department of Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) pamphlet, Protect Your Family from Lead in Your Home at our workshops.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The County of Ocean and its partners will continue an effort to reduce the number of poverty-level families through a family stabilization program, an employment related supportive service, and a subsidy from an affordable housing program. Many antipoverty programs and special needs programs that target prevention, crisis services, transitional services, permanent services, and long-term support for individuals and families that are homeless, at-risk persons of homelessness, and disabled and non-disabled.

The County of Ocean is deciding on and arranging in advance the following actions for the period of this Consolidated Plan and Action Plan. These actions include but not limited to the following:

- Advocate services and funding to address self-sufficiency and economic stability.
- Coordinate and share data with other organizations that plan and develop economic growth and job training.
- Assist seniors, veterans, and current members of the armed forces to attain optimal independence.
- Continue to support and fund activities undertaken by O.C.E.A.N. Inc., the County of Ocean's anti-poverty agency.
- Continue to support a housing agency and a Public Housing Authority's (PHAs) Family Self-Sufficiency program that assist an at-risk family with various educational, health care, and other services including, but not limited to economic stability and self-sufficiency services to enable individuals and families to be self-supporting.
- Continue to assist the Ocean County Board of Social Services (BOSS), which provides funding to a non-profit agency to administer a health and human service program.
- Support the Ocean County One-Stop Center, which operates a full-service career center that provides the following opportunities for job searches, job placements, and recruitment to employers and employees.
- Use HOME funds to fund the Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TRBA) program to serve homeless individuals and families.
- Use CDBG public service funds to fund non-profit (s) that implement homeless prevention programs.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The County of Ocean has a relatively strong institutional structure that manages and delivers a benefit to community development programs. This endeavor involves the following entities: the public, private,

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and non-profit sector. Many departments of government, private non-profit organizations, public agencies, regional planning councils, and various special purpose committees and bodies form partnerships integral to delivering the maximum number of beneficiaries that the institutional structure can bare. The following departments are a part of the structure that includes, but not limited to the Board of Social Services (BOSS), Health, Human Services, Planning, Senior Services, and the Veterans Bureau.

The County of Ocean continues to evaluate the operation of each of its community development programs in order to ensure that operations are within regulatory requirements, maximize the number of persons to benefit, and ensure easy access to these benefits by eligible persons. The County of Ocean is deciding on and arranging in advance the following actions for the period of this Consolidated Plan and Action Plan. These actions include, but not limited to the following:

- Identifying the number of Low-Moderate Areas (LMA) targeted to receive special assistance.
- Pursue relationships between the County and non-profit and for-profit housing providers of affordable housing.
- Actively coordinate with local municipal partners, Subrecipients, and Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs) in the preparation of the annual Action Plan.
- Participate in various committees that manage the Continuum of Care (CoC) and the Community Emergency Assistance Services (CEAS).
- Provide direct home ownership assistance to families otherwise unable to meet a down payment and closing cost requirement.
- Participate in training and conferences with affordable housing and public service providers.
- Engage and inform citizens about the Citizen Participation Plan (CPP) process.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The County of Ocean's Department of Planning (OCPD) acts as the coordinating entity and administrator for the consolidated plan, annual action plan, and the program development and management. The CDBG and HOME programs utilize federal, state, local resources, partnerships with local public and private entities, Subrecipients, and public service providers to achieve a common goal of providing affordable housing and social services to address the needs of the low- and moderate-income residents. The following list summarizes the coordination between the County of Ocean, the municipal governments, and the regional non-profit service providers:

Housing

Coordinate with the three (3) Public Housing Authorities (Berkeley, Brick, and Lakewood), the Community Housing Advisory Committee (CHAC), the HOME designated Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), the CDBG Rehabilitation; Single-Use Residential Subrecipients: O.C.E.A.N., Inc., Homes For All, Inc., and Northern Ocean Habitat for Humanity.

Homeless

Coordinate with the Board of Social Services (BOSS), the Community Emergency Assistance Services (CEAS), the Health Department, the Human Services Department, a medical care facility and hospital, and a non-profit entity that provides homeless assistance that may include a community and youth shelter.

Public Services

Coordinate with a CDBG funded non-profit organization that provides a service that includes, but not limited to childcare, domestic violence, elderly care, mental health, substance abuse, and youth service.

Public Facilities and Infrastructure Improvements

Coordinate with a local municipal government, including a county government department, to ensure a provision of an adequate public facility and infrastructure.

The County of Ocean Consortium receives HOME Investment Partnership Program block grant funding annually from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to create affordable housing for low- and moderate-income households. The County of Ocean has allocated funding from the HOME program to initiate the First-Time Homebuyer (FTHB) Program for income eligible households. The County of Ocean complies with § 92.254 and it has developed a resale and/or a recapture guideline for its HOME program.

First-time Homebuyer (FTHB)

The First-time Homebuyers Program offers a direct subsidy of \$10,000.00 for down payment and closing cost assistance secured by a deferred loan, mortgage, and mortgage note with an affordability period of six (6) years. The program features reduced bank fees and closing costs (including no points) and a minimum down payment of three (3) percent (1-1/2 percent of which MUST be from the borrower's own contribution, the other 1-1/2 percent can be from the County's HOME Program subsidy). The County of Ocean's program guidelines contain the following recapture provision:

If you sell your home (or change ownership) within the first six years of purchasing it, you will be subject to repayment of the full amount of HOME funds awarded to you through a deferred loan from the County of Ocean. The returned funds will be re-allocated into the HOME Program.

If the home transfers title within the six (6) year affordability period, the HOME recipient is subject to recapture the entire amount of the HOME-funded direct subsidy. There is no interest associated with the repayment. All recaptured funds will be reallocated into the HOME Program. If the HOME recipient maintains ownership of the home for the entire six (6) year affordability period, the lien is forgiven. In the event of any foreclosure on the property during the affordability period, the net proceeds (if any) of the foreclosure sale shall be used to repay in full all of the debt to the Lender. Net proceeds are the funds remaining after the first lien is satisfied. If there are no net proceeds, then there is no recapture obligation.

Housing Rehabilitation

With regard to the Housing Rehabilitation Program, home improvements are provided to eligible

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homeowners in the form of a Deferred Loan Agreement, which creates a ten-year (10) lien on the property. If the property transfers ownership within ten (10) years, the County will recapture all or a portion of the HOME funds associated with the project. The County's program guidelines contain the following recapture guidelines:

A reduction of repayment during the affordability period depends on how long the loan was in effect. For the first five years of the affordability period, any change of title will constitute the full recapture of the HOME-assisted funding. Thereafter, repayment is prorated as follows:

0-5 years - Full amount 6 years - 80% 7 years - 65% 8 years - 50% 9 years - 25% 10 years - 0%

There is no interest associated with these loans. If the homeowner remains in the home for the full term of ten (10) years, the lien is forgiven. All recaptured funds will be reallocated into the HOME Program.

Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)

Funding for the Tenant-Based Rental Assistance Program is provided to participants in the form of a grant as a rental subsidy; therefore, there is no resale or recapture provision associated with this program.

3. A description of the guidelines for resale or recapture that ensures the affordability of units acquired with HOME funds? See 24 CFR 92.254(a)(4) are as follows:

The CHDO Program guidelines and executed CHDO Agreements state that housing units assisted with HOME funds must meet the affordability requirements set forth in 24 CFR 92.252 and shall be enforced by a deed restriction on the property. The deed restriction shall be duly filed with the Ocean County Clerk. Affordability restrictions remain in force regardless of the transfer of ownership.

FY 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan/Action Plan & Pre-Development Meeting Overview

Program Introduction

Ms. Florio announced that the County of Ocean is holding this Action Plan Pre-Development Hearing in order to give citizens an opportunity to provide comments and input regarding what types of eligible activities the County should undertake and to discuss possible activities for funding under the Fiscal Year 2020-2024 Consolidate Plan and First-Year Action Plan of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. Additionally, Ms. Florio stated that the hearing would provide details regarding the application process, eligibility and compliance requirements, and an overview of the CDBG grant program.

Ms. Florio stated that the CDBG Program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitlement cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for lowand-moderate-income persons. Ms. Florio explicated that the CDBG Program is authorized under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, Public Law 93-383, as amended; 42 U.S.C.-530.1 et seq. The CDBG Program, additionally, provides eligible cities and counties with annual formula-based grants. Revitalizing neighborhoods, expanding affordable housing, offering economic opportunities and improving community facilities and services are a few of the objectives that utilize CDBG grants.

The Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funding received supports eligible CDBG activities or projects that meet priority community needs locally. During the five-year consolidated planning process, identifying and updating the needs of a community are a priority. Entitlement communities develop their programs and funding priorities. All activities carried out with CDBG funding must meet one of the following national objectives:

- · Benefit low and moderate-income persons
- · Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight
- Meet community needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community where other financial resources are not available to meet such needs (a need resulting from a State or Federal declared disaster)

The Consolidated Plan must include several required certifications, including the certification that not less than 70% of the CDBG funds received, by the grantee, will be used for activities that benefit low- and moderate-income persons.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - develop viable urban communities by providing: decent housing, ADA accessibility, infrastructure improvement, suitable living environment, and expanding economic opportunities.

Ocean County administers the CDBG program as an Urban County. The municipalities of Brick, Toms River, and Lakewood receive their own CDBG funding allocation as an entitlement community. The other entitlement community, Jackson Township, receives its own CDBG funding allocation, which Ocean County administers.

HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) - a wide range of activities including: acquiring, developing, and/or rehabilitating affordable housing for rent or homeownership, and providing direct rental assistance to low income people.

HUD established the HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME) in 1992 to expand the amount of decent, safe, and affordable housing

Our Ocean County HOME Program has four components:

- 1. First-Time Homebuyers Program
- Rental Housing Production through Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO's)
- 3. Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation
- 4. Tenant-Based Rental Assistance

Funding Allocations – Historical and Present

Ms. Florio mentioned the funding allocation received in fiscal year 2019 for both the CDBG and HOME programs from U.S. HUD. Ms. Florio delved further into the historical funding levels from previous years that the County has received as its allocation. Ms. Florio also explained that U.S. HUD has not released yet their fiscal year 2020 funding allocations. The County of Ocean must await the announcement of funding from U.S. HUD. The U.S. Congress approves the overall CDBG funding.

- The Ocean County CDBG Program began in 1984. The County has received \$62 million in CDBG funds since 1985.
- 70% of funding must benefit low- and moderate-income persons. The County has exceed that percentage by using 100% of funding to benefit those persons.
- FY 2019 CDBG funding was \$1,175,084.00, which includes housing rehabilitation, municipal and public service projects.

- \$417,000.00 of FY 2019 funding is allocated for 12 municipal projects such as: handicap
 accessibility, street/sidewalk/curb improvements, and housing rehabilitation.
- \$195,000.00 of FY 2019 funding is allocated for 12 public service activities such as: food distribution, counseling and day care centers, domestic violence and youth runaway centers, homeless assistance, visiting homecare services and senior services.
- \$502,260.00 of FY 2019 for housing related programs.
- Brick (\$299,207.00), Toms River (\$373,151.00), Lakewood (\$1,047,682.00) and Jackson (\$177,384.00) are separate entitlements and will receive their own FY 2019 allocation. Jackson Township's funds will be included in the total County allocation since the County administers their program, thereby increasing the total allocation for the County to \$1,325,468.00.

Ms. Florio also reiterated that the two HUD CDBG programs viewed in a more simplistic manner helps understand their particular focus:

- · CDBG Community-wide (county-wide); broader scope for type of projects
- · HOME Housing-related only

In order to fund a project, the County has several committees authorized to approve the CDBG funding recommendations (Steering Committee) and oversight of the four components of the HOME program (County Housing Advisory Committee (CHAC). Ms. Florio mentioned that the overall recommendation to approve the CDBG and HOME funding comes from the Board of Chosen Freeholders.

Ms. Florio also explained that HUD has not released yet their fiscal year 2020 funding allocations.

Timeline and Meeting Schedule

The Organization Meeting Schedule and Timeline handout was distributed. Ms. Florio read the Timeline and Meeting Schedule in detail for the attendees; including emphasis about the application deadline is February 14, 2020. Ms. Florio advised the committee that the applications, instructions, and the DTN maps are available on the County's website, (http://www.planning.co.ocean.nj.us/frmCECommDev), provided on the agenda sheet.

Ms. Florio discussed that adhering to the U.S. HUD regulations is mandatory in regards to submitting the Action Plan for public hearings and deadlines. The Board of Chosen Freeholders and the U.S. HUD both approve the Five-Year Consolidated Plan and First-Year Action Plan. Surveys

Ms. Florio reiterated that the three surveys (community Needs, Fair Housing, and the Housing Surveys) and the public meeting schedule flyer is accessible through the County website (http://www.planning.co.ocean.nj.us/frmCECommDev). Survey Monkey is hosting our online surveys through the Ocean County Board of Social Services' (BOSS) account and assistance. Again, Ms. Florio stated that we are asking you to distribute this link and survey to as many people as possible. If anyone needs a hard copy (s) please let the County know and we will deliver (via mail or email) a hard copy (s) upon request.

Outreach

Ocean's Harbor House (Heidi Hartmann and Dawn Samaritano) mentioned that they completed the surveys and saw the flyer online through the County's website. They also mentioned seeing the surveys and flyer at the Homelessness Committee and Human Services committee. Heidi Hartmann said that she has already distributed the outreach material via email to her clients.

Adjournment

Ms. Florio opened the floor to address the concerns and the comments on the Pre-Development Plan hearing from the public.

Following the Q&A session, Ms. Florio asked the attendees if they had other questions. The meeting adjourned at 6:00 p.m.

Questions and Comments

Connie Pascale: He commented that the County of Ocean is still a consortium. Therefore, it receives its own source of CDBG and HOME funding.

Response: That the HOME program exists is the reason partly for why the Consortium came into being. The Entitlement communities receive CDBG but do not receive HOME funding.

Connie Pascale: Expanded on the conversation to include that the Entitlement communities are starting now their CDBG meetings.

Response: The County administers Jackson Townships' CDBG program. Many townships receive not only CDBG but also HOME funding if applicable.

[CHAS data]

Connie Pascale: Asked to receive a copy of the CHAS data. He mentioned that Toms River Township provided him a copy of the current CHAS data for their community.

Response: The County would provide the CHAS data when HUD made it available. At this time, HUD has not provided guidance and/or their Notice about the Consolidated Plan. Additionally, CHAS is a part of the Consolidated Plan; however, HUD does not allow initiating the Consolidated Plan until notification. In the meantime, the County will explore the Internet for CHAS, if available will distribute.

Connie Pascale: Asked to receive a hard copy of the County's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AIFHC). He mentioned having difficulty downloading a digital copy previously sent to him; not working right.

Response: Mentioned HUD does not allow initiating the Consolidated Plan until notification. Therefore, no word yet on the AIFHC.

Connie Pascale: Mentioned that AIFHC is a part of the public process and that there needs to be a Public Hearing on the AIFHC. HE expanded further that Toms River Township has a committee for the AIFHC. Additionally, he urged the County to have a public AIFHC process and a committee as well. If the County so chooses to have a committee he would like to volunteer to be a part of the committee.

Again, Connie Pascale request a hard copy of the 'revised' Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AIFHC). He mentioned receiving word a hard copy was delivered to his house years early but would like another copy now.

[Surveys]

Connie Pascale: He commented that the surveys seemed to be directed at organizations and not geared toward individuals and their responses. He mentioned that Toms River is going to redesign our surveys' to be more user-friendly with an individual focus. Furthermore, he expanded that the Fair Housing Survey and the Housing Survey should have preface prefatory remarks on the idea that the individual and his/her problems are a focus of the information ascertained from the survey responses.

Response: Individuals have responded. Not sure if can change the setup right now with the technology running with Survey Monkey.

Connie Pascale: He reiterated again that the surveys with an individual orientation and properly oriented questions than would receive better response in the beginning:

- Better to orient the questions to individuals
- Express individual's issues first before they proffer their experience through an
 institutional response to their problem

Response: Public meeting are a vehicle to express their concerns. It is where their problems can be heard. The survey (s) is a tool to capture the individuals' [their] voice including the institute speaking on behalf of their clients. As we know there are many who may not want to take the survey given their circumstances. The meetings and anonymous survey are tools to help make everyone's voice heard.

Connie Pascale: [Community Needs Survey and the Fair Housing Survey] he mentioned that the conclusions on race-based analysis from the Westchester County Court case should be reflected in these surveys and as included in the Public Meeting Flyer. Essentially, there should be mention to that if you are facing discrimination or ethnic based exclusion that these public meeting are for your circumstances too; a change to make your voice heard.

[Code Blue]

Connie Pascale: He commented that a permanent homeless facility be funded with CDBG funds. A facility of this kind can be funded with the public facility funding of the CDBG program. He suggested that 1 to 2 years of funding be set aside to create a facility for the homeless use. The municipalities can set aside the funding for such a facility through an agreement; it would benefit everyone. Mr. Pascale further mentioned that the Township of Toms River is setting up a committee that is a interfaith-based committee lead by Sue Jones (President) along with several local clergy on board already, including Father Scott at St. Joseph's Parish.

[Interfaith Housing Vouchers]

Connie Pascale: He mentioned that a housing benefit voucher used to be in-place to the local interfaith organizations. Now these vouchers are no longer in existence. The vouchers used to assist persons in getting back on their feet to move from faith-based housing into a permanent housing structure. He recommended the housing first model as a way for the County to approach this issue. This model key to prioritizing supportive housing because it would create more HOME funds to housing vouchers - more vouchers more stabilized people.

[Security Deposits]

Connie Pascale: He mentioned that the County should allocate more funding for issues involving persons with prior eviction cases. Often these people do not have the resources of money to provide security deposits. Therefore, more funding allocated toward this issue would be a means to prevent homelessness. He further mentioned that Catholic Charities is running a support program for this issue now even though O.C.E.A.N., Inc. is no longer running such a program.

[Affordable Housing Plan]

Connie Pascale: He mentioned that there is more work to be performed for the Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AIFHC). An AIFHC must do something - not significant enough to just acknowledge a problem, but an AIFHC must do something to address the problem.

[Housing Trust Fund]

Connie Pascale: He mentioned the County should create a housing trust fund to address problems related to homeless. He urged the County to establish a \$5.00 filing fee with the County Clerk's office - similar to what other counties have done. That way the \$5.00 fee would not only cover the New Jersey State Statute for the \$2.00 Code Blue but the other \$3.00 could be used on a homeless facility. People should have adequate places to go not just for 32 degree Fahrenheit but also a place to go when the temperature is at an excessive heat level as well.

[Discussion]

Response: Issue are issues we hope to hear about from the public at the Public Meetings scheduled ahead. That is why we are going out into the community and reaching out to them to receive a broader opinion on what matters to the community as a whole.

Connie Pascale: He mentioned that no one should be left in the cold or heat. The housing first model helps to get people back on their feet. In addition, the Trust Fund would help the at-risk persons to get access to funding.

[Additional Comments]

Robin Florio: Ms. Florio ask the attendees if they had additional comments. There were no comments.

Connie Pascale: Mr. Pascale mentioned again that he would appreciate a copy of our revised Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AIFHC). Additionally, he asked that when the CHAS data is available if we could let him know. He offered his email – cpascale24@gmail.com.

Response: The County acknowledge that we would do research on the most available CHAS data for Ocean County. If available, we would forward that data to him. If not, we mentioned that the previous Consolidated Plan had this information provided. If the next available CHAS data is in the Consolidated Plan for FYs 2020-2024 we will wait for HUD to notify us about initiating the Consolidated Plan to access the CHAS data. Again, we would forward that information upon availability.

Agencies are the ones that see the daily issues.

Connie Pascale (Representative on behalf of STEPS and Northern Habitat for Humanity.) -

Mr. Pascale stated that the Consolidated Plan mentions homelessness, emergency housing and affordable housing and such, the CDBG funds should be used for a public facility to make a homeless housing center to provide a permanent facility. Mr. Pascale remarked that the County needs a place for those who utilize Code Blue. Mr. Pascale believes that every town in the County would benefit from such a facility. Mr. Pascale stated that all CDBG funds could be pulled together for one (1) year as an incentive to create a larger pool funds to that would make a substantial RFP available to bid on. A transition center is needed and the prime example is the Code Blue facility. We should build upon that model and create a Code Blue for everyday not just when the temperatures become very cold but also for when the temperatures become very hot as well. Further, Mr. Pascale expanded that:

- More money should go towards a tenant based voucher program, which should be prioritized for those in a homeless shelter; help transition to sustainable housing.
- Money should be set aside for more TBRA to assist with permanent housing. Security deposit vouchers should be setup for emergency-to-permanent housing.
- The County should adopt a homeless trust fund. Twelve counties of thirty-one in NJ currently have such a trust fund. Ocean County should be the thirteenth. This would provide money to end homelessness.
- The County should create a Housing Authority.

Mr. Pascale commented that Fair Housing must be addressed in the AI. This process should be a public process to know the impediments that are being felt in the community - including biases against families, discrimination and exclusion of various age, sex, creed, etc., and those with mental handicaps etc.

Robin Florio Response - Ms. Florio apologized for not explaining and informing earlier the public about the Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice (AI). The AI is being updated

in accordance with HUDs requirements with data. Ms. Florio urged the public to continue to inform the staff about any impediments that the public faces in regards to fair housing at this public hearing. If there are any exclusions happening that, they are welcome to address them here tonight and by contacting our office. Ms. Florio proceed to read the Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing (AFFH) Act statement to the audience.

Pam Quatse (Member of Christ Episcopal Church. Manchester resident.) -

Ms. Quatse reiterated the need for a County established housing authority in Ocean County as Brick, Lakewood, Bayville and Berkeley already have a housing authority. Ms. Quatse informed those at the hearing that these authorities provide assistance for low-income individuals. Ms. Quatse reiterated the point of a need for housing vouchers. Ms. Quatse acknowledged that there is a dire need to improve transportation in Ocean County.

Ms. Quatse mentioned that she lives in a co-op in Whiting. Ms. Quatse acknowledged that if she did not have this affordable housing option, she could not live in Ocean County, maybe anywhere.

Ms. Quatse noted that on a federal level there are cuts to social security causing people to work longer, i.e. utilizing transportation for a longer amount of time. The need is great for public transportation and should be ramped up for commuting to and from work during non-peak working hours. It is challenging people to get to work in the County, as it is large and not walkable on a large scale.

Ms. Qutase mentioned that a woman because of the assistance from agencies like the ones here tonight, is now living in her community. Where would she live otherwise?

Amanda Mehrman (A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Ms. Mehrman stressed that a permanent shelter is needed - especially for hygiene (showering) purposes. Ms. Mehrman mentioned that there is a stigma to the homeless to get a job. It is challenging for homeless individuals to get interviews or jobs without access to showers/toiletries. that Ms. Mehrman commented that a permanent facility is needed and that if this were to become accessible this would resolve many homeless individuals' addiction challenges as drugs/alcohol that are used largely as a coping mechanism to being homeless. We need a transition center.

Ms. Mehrman reiterated the need for fair housing, affordable housing, and vouchers especially for security deports. The average for one bedroom apartment in the county is \$1,000 a month and cheaper places commonly have unsuitable living conditions (low maintenance, and drugs in

these locations, etc.). Not only is the rent high but security deposits are extremely hard to save for. People do not have the income to support themselves. People are sleeping in the cars and needing to buy convenience food to eat because they are living in the car. Ms. Mehrman commented could not save money eating that way, continuously chasing for a place to live, etc. because the cost of living is high. People have to leave town because cannot afford to live.

Ms. Mehrman feels that we are pushing good people out of the community and are setting the bar too high, as many people cannot meet the minimum due to hard life circumstances. Ms. Mehrman further explained that the summers are hot and where do homeless people go then. Let them live outside! Need a permanent place to stay out of the heat too. When public places close during the day, holiday etc. where do the people go when the temperature is not a code blue situation. The homeless are isolated from the social setting of the community.

Although emergency shelters are positive they are just a band-aid on a much larger issue. We need a permanent facility for homeless individuals so they can make connections with people, and can feel more dignified and apart of society.

Michelle Quartuccio (A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center]. Resident of Manchester.) -

Ms. Quartuccio feels that we need more awareness for the homeless in the County. People are under the impression that it is not a problem. It is a serious problem. How do we as a society have protections for animals but not for people? People are left out.

At Code Blue they have just accepted 15 more people including women, seniors, and disabled individuals who have been pushed out of their homes due to high rent. Ms. Quartuccio mentioned that she can only afford housing because she lives in a co-op in Manchester. When Code Blue ends people still don't have a place to live. We need a permanent facility.

People are living outdoors every day. We can do more for them. They deserve it.

Rosemarie Goebel (A volunteer at Saint Joseph Church's Housing Coalition. A Code Blue volunteer. Resident of Toms River.) -

Ms. Goebel stated that the housing situation is appalling. Hampton Gardens and James Street Apartments are dumps. No matter your job is, it is still challenging to afford rent. Rent is consistently around \$1,000 no matter what the condition of the apartments are. Minimum wage will not cut it for the rent. Since rent is too high most people have two decide what to pay for and what not to pay for. So larger expensed items they give up first. Many give up their car as they have to make a decision. This creates a need for public transportation.

My ministry spent \$36K last year on place families in housing. But where can you put families in appropriate condition and at affordable rent levels? A family of seven people in two rooms in a drug infested living accommodations is not sensible. Need truly affordable housing.

A county-level housing authority would stop slum lords and unsafe housing. Motels are dangerous for families. We need more affordable long-term housing. Toms River can do better. Money needs to be prioritized for homeless assistance.

Pattie Oyola (A seven-year employee at Just Believe Inc. A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Ms. Oyola works for Code Blue and every night she does an intake sheet for new people. One question is: How much is your monthly income? Few, if any make over \$800/month.

Applied housing is needed. Veterans should not be homeless. Any night in this country there is 10K homeless. In the County, there is an estimated 300 homeless individuals, but she can attest that it is much higher. Since November 8, 2019, the shelter added 101 new clients in addition to the regular clients. Some people are regular clients for 4 to 5 years now. People need housing that they can afford. Homeless people are not bad people they are just homeless.

People in these shelters cannot get housing. They need a transition place (homeless shelter). Clients are of many different categories: 18-78 ages. The facility has exceed the maximum of intake clients multiple times. The current facility can fit 20-43 but 30 is the maximum. We have wheelchair-bound and walker people, mental health issues and few with addictions. They placed 14 people in rehab and sober living and two individuals into long-term housing; one in Berkeley PHA and the other is a veteran. They have had a great success rate as they work to help people to get on their own. We need a building. There is an open invitation to visit. Many people receive SSI/SSDI but it is not enough. The facilities have 213 volunteers who work to give a hand-up not a hand out.

Rich Rose (Previously homeless. A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Mr. Rose shared his story of being a homeless veteran, living in a tent in Ocean County. While living outside in fridge temperatures, Mr. Rose elaborated in his medical condition that when he made it to Code Blue and after transportation to the hospital to see the doctors, they told him in two more hours his toes, while toes being purple-color at that time, the toes would have been amputated. Mr. Rose felt lost when homeless, sleeping at night in a tent that laid in damp, wet conditions, as there was nowhere to go. No matter where he went there was someone telling him that he had to leave and yet there were no places for him to go.

As a veteran, Mr. Rose said that he did not think of himself as special because he served and all that. Mr. Rose stated that living in the woods is not always a safe place. Many of the trails, people are high on crack, have knives and try to rob you and this is off Highland Parkway area. Mr. Rose spoke further that he and another guy decided to seek shelter in the Toms River Transit Bus Station comfort station. But after a while the New Jersey State Police and the County Sheriff Department came in and explained that they could not stay there even though the temperature was freezing outside and they had no place to live and no heated sheltering.

Laurie Huryk (Councilwoman in Toms River Township. A member of the homeless coalition.)

Recognized that there is homeless issues in Ocean County. Stated that there is a problem with continuity. If we had continuity, we could piggyback on opportunities, social services, etc. Code Blue is great but then the weather changes and the beds are no longer available. The township took a site visit to Bergan County to see how they did it. They are willing to meet with us and discuss our situation and their accomplishments. Bergen County ended chronic homelessness through their transition center. We need a:

- 1. Housing Authority
- 2. Real-estate tax
- 3. Similar to Bergen County Homeless Trust Fund
- 4. 90-day homeless shelter.

Suggested that Ocean County follows Bergen County's model and eradicate chronic homelessness. There is only so much townships can do without the county's support. The Township has proven code blue works. We have assist with cutting into homeless issues. Just need the will to do it. There are mechanisms the County can enact. Begging for help.

Angela Lockhart (A volunteer at Just Believe Inc. A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Inquired if abandoned buildings could be acquired with CDBG funds. The MVC building on Route 166, why not purchase that?

Ms. Florio Response - Cleared up Angela's question. The County needs an application and project proposal to give money to fund any projects.

Connie Pascale (Representative on behalf of STEPS and Northern Habitat for Humanity.) -

In response to Angela: "We could put out an RFP from municipalities after agreeing to pool funds to acquire buildings."

Terrance Turnbach (Councilwoman in Toms River Township.) -

Mr. Turnbach could not see how you could have a comprehensive plan without a homeless shelter. Can't see it. Mr. Turnbach agreed that the County needs to adopt a Homelessness Trust Fund in the Consolidated Plan. The County not creating a resolution. The County needs to create a resolution or an ordinance so we can get the funding for these homeless programs. In March 2019, the State adopted the Township's new regulations for Code Blue into its legislation. State Representatives, official elected to the House of Representatives, and local officials supported diverting funds to shelters, urging that the Freeholders support the needs of the community.

Amanda Mehrman (A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Asked what Ms. Florio meant about applications. Who needs to submit applications? Are there any developer incentives?

Ms. Florio Response - Explained HUDs requirements. HUD wants money to go towards the end of the projects, not from the start of the program. CDBG is results driven that requires the reporting of beneficiaries, etc. Moreover, these is an 18-month period to expend funds.

Just like we a learning from you tonight. You are learning a part of the CDBG requirements.

Rose Balbach Response (Ocean County Department of Human Services. A member of the Ocean County Human Services Advisory Council.) – Ms. Balbach explained further, how the County is expending budget line items on Human Services programs already for the needy and the perimeters of using the money.

Connie Pascale (Representative on behalf of STEPS and Northern Habitat for Humanity.) -

Asked if we could consolidate the funds and put an RFP for say \$1 million, not just a portion of the fund. There is an opportunity to do this type of proposal.

Ms. Florio Response - Ms. Florio responded with a clearer explanation of how we need to report the funding. We want funds to go to the best uses but we need to have a proposal that explains the services that would be provided, a building a location, thoroughly detailed.

Angela Lockhart (A volunteer at Just Believe Inc. A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Cannot the MVC property be a donation? State owns it?

Ms. Florio Response - Ms. Florio responded that the previous operations on this site might require site remediation. The land records can be check for ownership.

Rich Rose (Previously homeless. A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Mr. Rose mentioned his age is 61 years old. A funny story how I ended meeting these wonderful people is that my friend and I were walking out of the woods in a local neighborhood. My friend and I were hungry and I thought nothing of it to ask Terrance Turnbach, who was mowing his lawn at the time, if I could go through his garbage.

Amanda Mehrman (A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Homeless is an issue that affects us all. When people have little resources to eat it is very telling. Just to have a rest in a motel is \$56.00 (+-) a night. How can one save money when there is no kitchen to cook food? You cannot reapply money to another expense. Then where do you find money to wash, etc.?

Tom Finnerty (An employee at Ocean Mental Health. A member of PATH.) -

As an outreach worker that provides aide to the homeless with mental illnesses and transitions, I have many years of experience assisting people. In the years prior, before a Code Blue shelter, outreach workers would canvass the woods to find people in need of assistance. Today, the Code Blue shelter is a one-stop center where outreach can treat more people at once without hiking through the woods.

Mr. Finnerty stated that there needs to be a facility that people can go to towards the day so more extensive outreach can happen. Outreach helps to get individuals in long-term housing. This is especially important for people with previous evictions that do not seem to be a good candidate by landlord's standards. Outreach can help connect people with subsides that help and a landlord trust in renting to people with previous evictions.

Tom explained that the need is a daytime program for homeless to go to meet with outreach services and agencies.

From a mental health perspective, keeping you housing, or knowing where can go for housing is a big component.

Difficult for people to get housing when they have bad credit and convictions. Having a cornerstone to move forward is ruled out because of prior conditions or circumstances. So there

is a need to get the word out to private landlords so that we can work with them more often to find a solution to housing and mental health issues.

Mr. Finnerty further expanded on his points mentioned with the fact the homeless population need long-term housing to mitigate their need. IN fact, without long-term housing in the equation and just with case management only it's a herculean task to get housing.

Ms. Florio Response – Within the HUD CDBG rules and regulations we are bound to those rules and regulations. We cannot just violate the rules. We will lose that money if we do that.

Connie Pascale (Representative on behalf of STEPS and Northern Habitat for Humanity.) -

Reiterated the importance of consolidating the fund and putting an RFP out. Reiterated that we need to create a HOME Fund voucher service. It's the "chicken to get the egg."

Tom Finnerty (An employee at Ocean Mental Health. A member of PATH.) -

Mr. Finnerty asked, could code blue persons be prioritized with subsidies? I make this suggestion because chronic homelessness requirements difficult with Section 8 vouchers. Helping a person with housing is a scramble because when an opening happens that availability is gone immediately.

Dan Valentine (Running for Freeholder) -

Agreed that the County needs a permanent facility that is open all year round all hours of the day. Mr. Valentine stated that grassroots organizations, the County and HUD can work together to remediate the situation. Churches and non-profits could offer their assistance. WE can do it. Grassroots can come together. If HUD works with us, we can get it done.

Pattie Oyola (A seven-year employee at Just Believe Inc. A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Asked what the public needs to do to keep the momentum going to a homeless shelter.

Ms. Florio Response – Ms. Florio explained the funding process. The County/HUD needs to know where the funding is coming from and what other funding is going into the project. Ms. Florio explained that HUD asks questions such as - Who are the service providers? What is the capital? How will maintenance be acknowledged? What site is the project proposed for? What partners? What funders?

Ms. Florio directed the audience to look at federal standards of CDBG projects. Reminded that the meeting is to set the goals for the next five years and to get a better understanding of what the needs of the community is.

Rose Balbach Response (Ocean County Department of Human Services. A member of the Ocean County Human Services Advisory Council.) – Ms. Balbach explained further the funding process.

Joanne Grasso (A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Ms Grasso asked, if there is any funding from the State and/or local funds that can be used?

Robin Florio Response - Ms. Florio explained that we are here for the Five-Year Consolidated Plan and the First-Year Action Plan. That this point in time we do not the exact amount of federal funds for either Plan.

Last year, the funding for CDBG was \$1.2 million and HOME \$1.3 million. While we received that money, 15% was set aside for Public Services and Housing Rehabilitation.

Amanda Mehrman (A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Ms. Mehrman asked, if the \$1.2 million is the amount for 5 years?

Robin Florio Response - Ms. Florio explained that the \$1.2 million is per year.

Joanne Grasso (A volunteer at the Riverwood Park Emergency Shelter [Code Blue Center].) -

Ms. Grasso asked, if we were aware of the homeless issue and what was our plan?

Robin Florio Response - Ms. Florio explained that we are aware of the issue, including the newly formed group, Homeless Coalition.

Rose Balbach Response (Ocean County Department of Human Services. A member of the Ocean County Human Services Advisory Council.) – Ms. Balbach explained further that you might not like how the money is spent. But the County is spending money on these issues. The County appropriates funds from grants and the general funds on these issues. There is \$150,000.00 spent to support the Code Blue shelter with County money.

There is money spent to acknowledge the issues and problems. Many times money is earmarked to be spent in a certain way and cannot be used in other ways. We are trying to help to the best of our abilities. Who is going to build the shelter? You just cannot set a side funding to build and do an RFP.

Connie Pascale (Representative on behalf of STEPS and Northern Habitat for Humanity.) -

The County has the bully pulpit and can do it if it convinces its constituents.

Glen McDonald (Executive Director Homes for All, member of Interfaith Hospitality, and the Covenant House) -

Asked for a diagram or a better explanation of how to apply for the CDBG money. Felt that the nonprofits at the meeting could form a Housing Authority and work together to fill out the CDBG application.

We need to bring the synergy together of these groups. We need a road map. We need a full-time homeless shelter. If we had that, the problem would be radically different. We need to keep in mind the dignity of the human being. We need a road map. We have the energy. Need assistance.

Mr. McDonald expanded that there is a need for a bus with a bathroom/shower facilities that can be brought to places with a known homeless population.

Robin Florio Response – Ms. Florio thanked everyone for attending the hearing, respectfully thank him or her for all his or her efforts, and remind them to sign in and take a packet and directed them to the application for CDBG funding. Ms. Florio reiterated the application deadline is February 14, 2020. Ms. Florio again offered the services of our office for all assistance.

FY 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan/Action Plan & Public Meeting #2 Overview

Program Introduction

Ms. Florio announced that the County of Ocean is holding this Action Plan Pre-Development Hearing in order to give citizens an opportunity to provide comments and input regarding what types of eligible activities the County should undertake and to discuss possible activities for funding under the Fiscal Year 2020-2024 Consolidate Plan and First-Year Action Plan of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. Additionally, Ms. Florio stated that the hearing would provide details regarding the application process, eligibility and compliance requirements, and an overview of the CDBG grant program. Ms. Florio stated that we are in the middle of collecting input and comments from the public.

Ms. Florio stated that the CDBG Program provides annual grants on a formula basis to entitlement cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for lowand-moderate-income persons. Ms. Florio explained that the CDBG Program is authorized under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, Public Law 93-383, as amended; 42 U.S.C.-530.1 et seq. The CDBG Program, additionally, provides eligible cities and counties with annual formula-based grants. Revitalizing neighborhoods, expanding affordable housing, offering economic opportunities, improving community facilities, and services are a few of the objectives that utilize CDBG grants. Ms. Florio stated that Ocean County is part of a consortium. Brick, Jackson, Lakewood, and Toms River are entitlement communities that receive CDBG funding. All municipalities sign an agreement to be a part of the HOME program. That is a separate agreement. The HOME program encompasses the entire region benefiting everyone across the region, including persons in the entitlement communities too.

The Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funding received supports eligible CDBG activities or projects that meet priority community needs locally. During the five-year consolidated planning process, identifying and updating the needs of a community are a priority. Entitlement communities develop their programs and funding priorities. All activities carried out with CDBG funding must meet one of the following national objectives:

- · Benefit low and moderate-income persons
- Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight
- Meet community needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community where other financial resources are not available to meet such needs (a need resulting from a State or Federal declared disaster)

The Consolidated Plan must include several required certifications, including the certification that not less than 70% of the CDBG funds received, by the grantee, will be used for activities that benefit low- and moderate-income persons. All funds (100%) goes towards benefitting low-income persons. Additionally, allocation distribution is setup to meet HUD requirements:

- Administrative allocation 20%
- Public service allocation (regional non-profits) 15%
- Municipal allocation biennial distribution.
- CDBG funding (\$1.2 million) a portion is set aside for housing-related needs such as sustainability conditions that keep the house up to civil building codes
- HOME funding (\$1.3 million) a portion is set aside for housing-related needs such as Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (24-month assistance; a large portion of allocated funds), housing rehabilitation (substantial code violations \$25K maximum; 10-year lien pro-rated at the sale), and Community Housing Development Organization (mandatory 15% allocation)
- Community Housing Development Organization (CHDO) 8 agencies paired down to 6 at this time. Currently two (2) projects underway: 1. Pine Beach Borough, 6-units veterans housing of 6 units (Spring 2020), 2. Tuckerton Borough – Tuckers Walk, 24units elderly, veterans housing, phased-in community (Fall 2020).
- First-Time Homebuyers (FTHB) highlights include 1. 550 (+-) persons assisted, 2. low foreclosure rate, 3. \$10k subsidy, 4. 6-year loan pro-rated.

As you can see a broad-basis of programs support a variety of needs, including housing, throughout the communities in Ocean County. Moreover, if there are any questions or concerns about these programs our staff is available to answer your questions.

Eligible Activities

Eligible activities that may receive CDBG funds, which include, but are not limited to:

- Acquisition of real property
- Relocation and demolition
- · Rehabilitation of residential and non-residential structures
- Construction of public facilities and improvements, such as water and sewer facilities, streets, neighborhood centers, and the conversion of school buildings for eligible purposes
- · Public services, within certain limits
- Activities relating to energy conservation and renewable energy resources
- Provision of assistance to profit-motivated businesses to carry out economic development and job creation/retention activities

Ineligible Activities

Ineligible activities that may receive CDBG funds, which do not meet one of these national objectives, are of the following types of activities:

- Acquisition, construction, or reconstruction of buildings for the general conduct of government
- Political activities
- Certain income payments
- · Construction of new housing (with some exceptions)

The County promotes fair housing and makes all programs available to low and moderateincome families regardless of age, race, color, religion, sex, national origin, sexual preference, marital status or handicap.

Surveys

• Ms. Florio reiterated that the three surveys (community Needs, Fair Housing, and the Housing Surveys) and the public meeting schedule flyer is accessible through the County website (http://www.planning.co.ocean.nj.us/frmCECommDev). Survey Monkey is hosting our online surveys through the Ocean County Board of Social Services' (BOSS) account and assistance. Again, Ms. Florio stated that we are asking you to distribute this link and survey to as many people as possible. If anyone needs a hard copy (s) please let the County know and we will deliver (via mail or email) a hard copy (s) upon request. Ms. Florio reminded the public that the deadline for surveys has been extended to February 7, 2020. The survey period received an extension because the citizen feedback would be closed when the third public meeting in Stafford Township (Stafford Library).

Consolidated Plan

02/06/2020) took place. Therefore, the deadline was extend to accommodate the public information received from that meeting.

- Ms. Florio also stated to the audience that the survey could be accessed through the QR scanner codes on the table to her left. Ms. Florio mentioned that your smartphone camera could be utilized to read the code and write the survey's web address directly to a browser webpage on your phone. That way, a user will not need to navigate through multiple webpages to access a survey of their choice.
- Ms. Florio also spoke about the current survey input recorded. Input reviewed about a
 week to 10 days ago and the respondents were more than 100+. Ms. Florio also stated
 that handicapped data entry is being accounted for as well.

Again, Ms. Florio reiterated to the audience the following about the CDBG and HOME programs:

- Activities must meet a national objective that benefits low-to moderate-income (LMI) persons.
- Our fiscal year begins 7/1/2020 and the submittal date for the Consolidated Plan is May 15, 2020. A part of that submittal is the first-year Action Plan.
- · Important materials are on our website: the Application and the LMI web mapper.
- The County receives our funding from U.S. HUD. With that funding, priority and needs
 of the community heard, discussed, and taken into consideration at meeting like this one.
 That is why we are here tonight, to hear from you?
- Funding priorities are determined via several committees, community suggestions and meeting a national objective.
- Low- and moderate-income (LMI) persons receive 100% of CDBG funding, excluding the administration funding. Those funds benefiting LMI persons may also benefit LMI persons through the low- and moderate- income areas (LMIA) (aka designated target neighborhood (DTN).
- Public services receives 15% of the overall grant allocation.

- Again, we are in our five-year plan, surveys are on our website as discussed. Our County's Human Services Department assisted with distribution of the surveys via multiple email blasts to agencies in their rolodex.
- Also with the five-year consolidated plan process, we are in the process of updating the Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing (AI).

Adjournment

Ms. Florio opened the floor to address the concerns and the comments on the Public Meeting #2 from the public at 6:20 p.m.

Following the Q&A session, Ms. Florio asked the attendees if they had other questions. The meeting adjourned at 6:40 p.m.

Joseph "Dick" Reed (Retired Toms River civil engineer - Toms River resident - Donates his services to Northern Ocean Habitat for Humanity for the past 20 years) -

Mr. Reed began to address his question around the issue with homelessness. Mr. Reed explained that recently an interfaith (clergy) based homeless coalition has formed that is a 501(c)(3). The group has formed to assist with homelessness issues and moving homeless from a temporary shelter to a permanent shelter.

Mr. Reed stressed that there is a need for a resource to get to a permanent shelter and that maybe transitional housing is a possible solution.

With an extensive background at Northern Ocean Habitat for Humanity (NOHFH) he is aware of the homelessness problem within the County of Ocean. Though Code Blue is beneficial to the homeless population during times of extreme cold and heat, it is not a long-term solution. Tiny Home clusters or modified housing units could work to provide small homes for homeless individuals or small families. He noted that there are zoning restrictions that may limit the plausibility of this solution. However, if there could be an incentive for tiny houses or shipping container housing, (other Habitat's are doing this now). Mr. Reed has thought that we need to thinking outside the box to find solutions to homelessness and affordable housing.

Along with homelessness, another pertinent problem that could benefit from CDBG funds is the critical home repairs program led by Northern Ocean Habitat for Humanity (NOHFH). In the beginning, the outside beautification to a home was the core function of the program. While funding did not come from Jackson or Plumsted, NOHFH did extend its geographic areas into those communities. Over time, the program moved from the outside to the inside repairs of a

home; modified into sustainability living repairs. This program works to rehabilitate and update the interior of homes with the ability to perform updates to the outside as well like handicapped stair access.

Many seniors live in the County (second highest elderly retirement community population in the country, except for Arizona) in low-rent buildings. He has found that many veterans and seniors live in mobile homes, which are challenging to repair due to the custom shape of the elements to the structure itself. These homes are outdated and built with cheaper materials. The continued repair, though unsustainable, is helpful to the homeowners, as they would likely become homeless without these repairs. Many repairs include, elevated toilets, grab bars, ramps for wheelchairs, and steps for walkers. These repairs stabilize neighborhoods.

By staying in their homes, people are able to age in place, which benefits the individual and the community. As a long-term solution, the County can buy the mobile home property and build permanent homes or condominiums. A Homeless Trust Fund should be implemented and these funds could be used to perform this transaction.

At the NOHFH, we have a veteran's repair program where we reach out to the VFW and the American Legion to get the word out that we are here to help. Many veterans are homebound, and we have the resources to rebuild steps to access the home, etc. One veteran we recently helped had a stroke. He is wheelchair bound and at night we his nurse –aide leaves he if left to his own graces. The mobile home he lives in the opening for the doors for the bathroom and bedroom is not wide enough for his wheelchair. So he is left to excrete in a chamber pot near the bed. Only in the morning when the nurse-aide returns can he move better from bed to other parts of his home.

Currently, NOHFH performs about three (3) repairs a month between the block grant, the resale store, and donated material. A repair is about \$5,000.00. Mr. Reed asked that there be consideration for increasing the housing rehabilitation given demographics.

Another issue is mobile homes. In our County, a mobile home park has not been built in like 50-60 years at least. So the existing parks are aging, difficult to work on because due to the custom shape of the elements to the structure itself. If there is a draft through the windows, those windows are not a standard size as an example. So custom windows need to be made to fit the current dimensions. Same goes for doors and other elements of the mobile home. So the mobile home parks and the need to rehab on a large scale are a ticking time bomb. The cost of repair exceed the cost of the home; losing money.

Mr. Reed asked if he could forward his thoughts in a letter.

Ms. Florio Response - Ms. Florio further expanded on the need for more funding. Ms. Florio explained that we are currently accepting applications and with the application, more funding can be requested. However, there is a cap on the public service funding and that amount is 15% for all the public service activities funded. The amount of funding is very competitive. Additionally, we attempted not to duplicate services. There are several single-use housing rehabilitation organizations operating with CDBG funds, but all are doing different types of services and in geographically different areas.

Now in saying that and hearing that NOHFH is exploring and idea of purchasing a mobile home park, our County HOME program has a program called Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDO). So becoming a CHDO may be an avenue to move from individual rehabilitation repairs to a larger-scale new construction. That way, there is access to more mechanisms for financing housing construction and rehabilitation and repairs.

Within the HUD CDBG rules and regulations, we are bound to those rules and regulations of funding. In addition, we have worked to create a tiny homes cluster, called Tuckers Walk, in Tuckerton; a project for many veterans and housing for that group. This project is finally coming to fruition but it has faced many obstacles and extensive opposition, including zoning issues and financing too. We also have a small cluster housing project underway now in Pine Beach with O.C.E.A.N., Inc. This project is for veterans.

Ms. Florio also explained that Mr. Reed is welcome to forward a letter with his thoughts. As that information, as well as, what he dictated tonight for the record, will be incorporated into the Five-Year (2020-2024) Consolidated Plan.

Dear Ms. Florio:

Below are three issues involving affordable housing that I expressed at the hearing on January 30th in the Jackson Township Library, and my recommendations for inclusion in the Plan:

- 1. HOMELESSNESS: The coalition of clergy and others that have formulated a plan to address the homeless in Ocean County are proposing a shelter for only temporary occupancy. It follows that there will ultimately be a need for permanent housing for those individuals that have been rehabilitated. Many of the homeless are single, and do not need nor can they afford a normal 3-bedroom house or an apartment. There is a need for alternate housing such as the "Tiny Home" cluster; or the possible use of modified shipping containers as housing units. These solutions face public opposition as well as restrictions in the zoning and subdivision regulations. The Plan could include incentives and possible funding of innovative ways to help solve this problem.
- 2. CRITICAL HOME REPAIRS: Northern Ocean Habitat for Humanity (NOHFH) is now a recipient of CDBG funding from Ocean County and the townships of Toms River and Brick. Our repair program however receives applications from Berkeley Township, Lakehurst, Jackson Township, Plumsted Township, and Manchester Township, for which reimbursement must come from only the County. As a result, we quickly exhaust the available funds. Our Aging-In-Place and Veteran Repair programs are addressing the large concentration of retirement communities and veteran residents that are unique to Ocean County. The Plan could request additional funding from HUD based on the demographics of the county.
- 3. MOBILE HOME REPAIRS: The repair of homes for owners in the low-income category has included mobile homes, based on the fact that the home is owned but the land is rented. Many of the homes are 50 to 60 years old, and appear to be well past their useful life. Often it appears that the cost of critical repairs will exceed the market value of the unit. None the less, repairs are being made since the residents might well be homeless otherwise. With the great number of mobile home parks, the problem will only get more severe. Nationally, there are cases where the park is acquired, and the mobile homes are

gradually replaced with permanent homes, and plots are conveyed through a condominium conversion. The Plan could include a study of this problem and recommendations for implementing innovative solutions. Having the park conveyed to a Homeless Trust Fund could insure perpetual inclusion in affordable housing.

• Ms. Florio reiterated that the three surveys (community Needs, Fair Housing, and the Housing Surveys) and the public meeting schedule flyer is accessible through the County website (http://www.planning.co.ocean.nj.us/fmCECommDev). Survey Monkey is hosting our online surveys through the Ocean County Board of Social Services' (BOSS) account and assistance. Again, Ms. Florio stated that we are asking you to distribute this link and survey to as many people as possible. If anyone needs a hard copy (s) please let the County know and we will deliver (via mail or email) a hard copy (s) upon request. Ms. Florio reminded the public that the deadline for surveys has been extended to February 7, 2020. The survey period received an extension because the citizen feedback would be closed when the third public meeting in Stafford Township (Stafford Library 02/06/2020) took place. Therefore, the deadline was extend to accommodate the public information received from that meeting.

- Ms. Florio also stated to the audience that the survey could be accessed through the QR scanner codes on the table to her left. Ms. Florio mentioned that your smartphone camera could be utilized to read the code and write the survey's web address directly to a browser webpage on your phone. That way, a user will not need to navigate through multiple webpages to access a survey of their choice.
- Ms. Florio also spoke about the current survey input recorded. Input reviewed about a
 week to 10-days ago and the respondents were more than 100+. Ms. Florio also stated
 that handicapped data entry is being accounted for as well.

Again, Ms. Florio reiterated to the audience the following about the CDBG and HOME programs:

- Activities must meet a national objective that benefits low-to-moderate income (LMI) persons.
- Our fiscal year begins 7/1/2020 and the submittal date for the Consolidated Plan is May 15, 2020. A part of that submittal is the first-year Action Plan.
- · Important materials are on our website: the Application and the LMI web mapper.
- The County receives our funding from U.S. HUD. With that funding, priority and needs
 of the community heard, discussed, and taken into consideration at meeting like this one.
 That is why we are here tonight, to hear from you?
- Funding priorities are determined via several committees, community suggestions, and meeting a national objective.
- Low- and moderate-income (LMI) persons receive 100% of CDBG funding, excluding the administration funding. Those funds benefiting LMI persons may also benefit LMI persons through the low- and moderate-income areas (LMIA) (aka designated target neighborhood (DTN)).
- Public services receives 15% of the overall grant allocation.
- Again, we are in our five-year plan, surveys are on our website as discussed. Our County's Human Services Department assisted with distribution of the surveys via multiple email blasts to agencies in their rolodex.

 Also with the five-year Consolidated Plan process, we are in the process of updating the Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing (AI).

Ms. Florio opened the floor to address the concerns and the comments on the Public Meeting #3 from the public at 6:25 p.m.

Following the Q&A session, Ms. Florio asked the attendees if they had other questions. The meeting adjourned at 7:20 p.m.

Questions and Comments

Jean Czarkowski (Toms River Resident. Lifelong Ocean County Resident - Works as a Clinical Social Worker and is an advocate for adults with mental disabilities) -

Ms. Czarkowski began her comments by advocating for a homeless shelter within the County. There is proof that the County could benefit from a shelter as there are 30-40 people in Toms River that utilize Code Blue shelters when they are open. Ms. Czarkowski felt that it would be beneficial for the County to review how many people rely on Code Blue to form a better understanding of the homelessness problem the County faces. If a shelter were to be open nonprofits would be able to have better access to helping those in need – rather than looking for homeless in wooded areas within the County. If public, private, and nonprofits can work together positive change can occur. As someone with a sibling that has disabilities, Ms. Czarkowski has seen firsthand the need for collaboration between private and public sectors. The solutions are out there to the problems many face, though it is a challenge to be connected with the correct groups that can help.

Ms. Czarkowski asked what the five-year Plan does and what the outcome of the last five-year Plan was.

Robin Florio Response - Specified that within the five-year Plan we prioritize the needs and goals of the County.

Scott Cadigan Response - Shared that in the last five-year Plan we prioritized accessibility for community centers, accessibility in bathrooms and entranceways in public buildings, as well as, beach access for those with a physical handicap. Public hearings and surveys expressed those priorities.

Jean Czarkowski (Toms River Resident. Lifelong Ocean County Resident - Works as a Clinical Social Worker and is an advocate for adults with mental disabilities) -

6:00 PM

Ms. Czarkowski inquired about Universally Designed standards for public areas, notably for playgrounds. Specifically, she asked whether Field of Dreams could receive funds to become accessible, as it would be a great place for seniors, young children, disabled persons, etc. to get together and build a more integrated community.

Scott Cadigan Response - Agreed that a Universally Designed playground would meet the needs of handicapped/disabled users. There could be potential for one to be built within a Designated Target Area (low-income area).

Robin Florio Response - Informed Ms. Czarkowski that there is a 15% cap on all public service projects.

Jean Czarkowski (Toms River Resident. Lifelong Ocean County Resident - Works as a Clinical Social Worker and is an advocate for adults with mental disabilities) -

Ms. Czarkowski understood that the County must follow the Federal guidelines when utilizing these funds but asked if the County could encourage engineers and consultants to utilize Universal Design (UD) concepts in their applications. For example, Homes for All, a recipient of the CDBG funds, should design new construction with UD concepts. Rehabilitated homes could be retrofitted to meet UD standards as well. This would help individuals stay in their homes longer as UD homes meet the needs of individuals with injuries and aging.

Robin Florio Response - Thanked Ms. Czarkowski for her suggestion and noted that Universal Design language could be inserted in our RFP moving forward.

Jean Czarkowski (Toms River Resident. Lifelong Ocean County Resident - Works as a Clinical Social Worker and is an advocate for adults with mental disabilities) -

Ms. Czarkowski inquired if CDBG funds could go to the Vo-Tech school to help train students how to design UD buildings and projects to better train the future engineers and consultants to design inclusive areas. If money cannot go towards Vo-Tech, then Ms. Czarkowski questioned if the County could create an incentive for nonprofits that do receive CDBG funds to create an internship program, which in turn would meet the needs of the HUD funding and provide opportunities to young professionals.

Robin Florio Response - Clarified that a nonprofit would have to be the ones to have an internship program and CDBG funds would not go towards creating one. Ms. Florio shared that Homes for All has an internship program already in place, Hands for All, and we could coordinate with them to encourage the continuation of this program for CDBG funded projects.

Jean Czarkowski (Toms River Resident. Lifelong Ocean County Resident - Works as a Clinical Social Worker and is an advocate for adults with mental disabilities) -

Ms. Czarkowski thanked Robin for the information. In order to have a better understanding of what CDBG funds could and could not go to she asked whether the funds could be utilized for infrastructure improvements aimed at flood drainage treatments and stormwater improvements. As it stands now we do not have a treatment service in place for rainwater.

Robin Florio Response - Clarified that CDBG funds could be used for flood drainage and street improvements in regards to floodwater mitigation as long as the area is in a DTN.

Tanara Hall Response - Suggested that Ms. Czarkowski look into State Grants for floodwater mitigation. Ms. Hall lives in an area that received money from State Grants to help with street improvements.

Jean Czarkowski (Toms River Resident. Lifelong Ocean County Resident - Works as a Clinical Social Worker and is an advocate for adults with mental disabilities) -

Ms. Czarkowski spoke about reaching-out to the Community Ambassadors; a youth based group located in the local high schools [Lakewood and Toms River South]. These groups are made of youth, including Spanish youth that perform community outreach in their communities.

Tanara Hall Response - Tanara asked if she could put her in contact with the Community Ambassadors program, a community advocacy group for Spanish and Latin community members within the County.

Robin Florio Response - Thanked Ms. Czarkowski for her suggestions, questions and comments. Ms. Florio notified Ms. Czarkowski that Jackson, Brick, Lakewood and Toms River all receive their own funding and engage in a separate five-year Plan outlining their goals and priorities for the funding they receive. Ms. Florio suggested she attend their public meetings, or send her input to them, as some of the projects she suggested may be better funded through one of those townships.

Jean Czarkowski (Toms River Resident. Lifelong Ocean County Resident - Works as a Clinical Social Worker and is an advocate for adults with mental disabilities) -

Ms. Czarkowski thanked Ms. Florio for the advice and asked whether the public input from the meetings, both the County public meetings and the townships' public meetings, are available to the public.

Robin Florio Response – Ms. Florio responded to Ms. Czarkowski's question by directing her to the meeting schedule provided at the public hearing. The comments will be in the draft version of the five-year Plan, which will be available for public comment for 30-days. She encouraged

Ms. Czarkowski to send any additional comments to herself or Scott Cadigan for incorporation into the Plan. Mr. Florio additional mentioned that our surveys are on our internet site. Ms. Florio asked if Ms. Czarkowski had taken a survey yet?

In response to the Coronavirus Pandemic (COVID-19), the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has notified the County of Ocean that it will receive an allocation of \$2,098,176.00 in Community Development Block Grant-COVID (CDBG-CV3) funds to be used to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19. This allocation was authorized by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-136, which was signed into law on March 27, 2020 to respond to the growing effects of this historic public health crisis.

The County of Ocean has prepared a Substantial Amendment to the FY 2020 Annual Action Plan to promptly make CDBG-CV3 funds available to address the needs of the community to prevent the spread and mitigate impacts caused by COVID-19. The Substantial Amendment has been developed in accordance with Ocean County's adopted Citizen Participation Plan, which provides for and encourages citizen participation.

A portion of the CDBG-CV3 funds in the amount of \$1,285,244.00 will be available for temporary emergency rental assistance for eligible households for up to six (6) months of back rent.

A portion of the CDBG-CV3 funds in the amount of \$812,932.00 will be available to qualified nonprofit 5D1(c)(3) agencies serving Ocean County residents. The CDBG-CV3 funds will be able to support a variety of activities that prevent, prepare for and respond to COVID-19 including but not limited to:

- Public service activities such as senior services, food provision, emergency assistance, homelessness prevention, childcare, health, drug abuse, domestic violence services, etc.
- Public facilities and improvement projects that directly contribute to addressing COVID-19 related issues. This includes equipment and other property needed for the public service, labor, supplies and material to operate and/or maintain the portion of a facility in which the public service is located.
- Other eligible activities that directly prevent prepare and respond to COVID-19.

WHEREAS, the Ocean County Consortium FYs 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan and FY 2020 Action Plan has been the subject of several public meetings throughout the planning process and has been made available for public review during the public comment period including review by the Ocean County Community Development Block Grant Committee and the Ocean County Housing Advisory Committee (CHAC); and

WHEREAS, upon approval of the Ocean County Consortium FY 2020 Action Plan, the County of Ocean anticipates the allocation of FY 2020 Federal grant funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the following programs: the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), the Ocean County \$1,213,117.00 plus the Township of Jackson \$182,184.00 for which the County Administers, for a total allocation of \$1,359,301.00 and the HOME Investment Partnership Program \$1,350,003.00.

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

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

The County requested a waiver to use the funds specifically for grants to non-profits.

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



The County of Ocean developed four (4) public surveys for this Consolidated Plan and Action Plan. A summary of each survey is below:

Housing Survey

This housing survey provided county level information on a wide range of housing subjects. Topics unique to this survey include the counts of households with one or more housing problems by income level, tenure, and household type. The survey results will play an extremely valuable role as part of the efforts to increase public and private sector support for greater housing and residential support options for the residents of the County of Ocean.

Fair Housing Survey

The Fair Housing Survey posed a series of questions depicting complaints taken by assisted living providers, Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs), housing rehabilitation providers, and the public service providers, which might or might not have been discriminatory. Respondents were asked:

- 1. The number of fair housing complaint (s) known
- 2. The type of complaint and how it was handled
- 3. If required to submit a Fair Housing Report to another entity under federal law

In addition, the results of this survey will assist in the identification and analysis of any impediments to housing choice, thereby affirmatively furthering fair housing in our communities.

Describe the total population from which the sample was taken.

Between December 7, 2019 and February 7, 2020, the Ocean County Consortium surveyed many residents to determine the housing needs, the housing demand, the impediments to housing choice, and the needs and preferences of people living and working in the County of Ocean. Those people surveyed represent a random sample of residents. A number of respondents were male and female genders, various races, age groups, educational attainment, household income, homeowners and tenants.

Describe the demographics of the respondents or characteristics of the unit of measure, and the number of respondents or units surveyed.

The population segments were a mix of demographics and attitudinal drivers that responded. These surveys, however, were never interested in the characteristics of individual respondents *per se*. These surveys are interested in statistics that combine the survey answers to summarize the characteristics of groups of persons. These sample surveys combine the answers of individual respondents in statistical computing steps to construct statistics describing all persons in the sample. At this point, these surveys are now closely aligning to a description of characteristics of a larger population from which the samples were drawn. The following two inferential steps are central to our surveys and are the two needed characteristics of a survey:

- 1. Answers people give must accurately describe characteristics of the respondents.
- 2. The subset of persons participating in the survey must have characteristics similar to those of a larger population.

Those people surveyed represent a random sample of residents. A number of respondents were male and female genders, various races, age groups, educational attainment, household income, homeowners and tenants.
